Dear Sir or Madam,

I'm writing on behalf of People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA) with an exciting proposal: how about becoming the world's first vegan Slaughter House by switching to an all-vegan menu?

Since vegan living is booming in the UK – new research shows that the number of vegans here has risen by 700 per cent in the past two years – offering a wide variety of delicious plant-based meals would put The Slaughter House at the cutting edge of modern cuisine. Companies are investing billions in innovative vegan products, including meat-free burgers that "bleed", and the list of animal-free dishes on restaurant menus is expanding exponentially to meet demand.

Each person who goes vegan spares the lives of more than 100 animals each year.

Others want to save their own necks: according to the British Medical Association, those who ditch meat slash their risk of suffering from obesity, heart disease, and high blood pressure. A 2015 World Health Organization report reveals that consuming processed meats such as bacon and sausages increases the risk of cancer. Vegan meals are greener, too, as animal agriculture is a leading producer of greenhouse-gas emissions. And the United Nations has concluded that a global shift towards a vegan lifestyle is necessary to combat the worst effects of climate change.

Liverpool native Paul McCartney has said, "If slaughterhouses had glass walls, everyone would be vegetarian," but if The Slaughter House made this change to its menu, everyone would be vegan – no glass walls
