Lesson Plan 3: Changing for the Better

Lots of projects are aimed at making an area of land better for wildlife and people to enjoy. One school, St Clere's in Essex, decided to attract wildlife to their school by digging a pond. This is how they did it:

- 1. They got planning permission from the local council.
- 2. They got permission from the local water authority to fill a pond.
- 3. They bought a large pond liner from a specialist.
- 4. They dug the pond and erected a safety fence around it.
- 5. With the help of the fire brigade, they filled the pond with water.
- 6. They planted a reed bed.
- 7. They dug up bramble roots and planted trees around the margins of the pond.

Pupils stated that within a few weeks of being filled, the pond was being visited by dragonflies, water beetles and pond skaters.
