After hearing from PETA, travel company On Site Events stopped its tours to the Running of the Bulls event in Pamplona, Spain, where bulls are tormented and killed. Both those activities are horrifically cruel, and we are determined to see them out the door.


Sometimes animals suffer in awful circumstances not caused by human cruelty – and PETA is there for them as well.
